From MacDuffie to Harvard







What brought me to Harvard is my passion for quality education and education equity.

Which grades did you attend MacDuffie, and what year did you graduate?

I joined MacDuffie as a freshman in August 2013. I graduated in 2017.

Where are you from originally?

I am from Chengdu, China, which is also the hometown of giant pandas!

Do you remember having a favorite class or teacher?

This is a hard one, because I was fortunate to meet many caring and inspiring teachers, such as Mr. Hillman, Ms. O'Brien, Mr. Taravella, and Mr. Polga. If I have to pick one teacher, then it is Mr. Shelburne. I kept all my notes from his Calculus and Statistics classes. I recently reviewed my Stats notebook for my grad school class and found it super helpful. Mr. Shelburne not only taught me math, but also encouraged me to be a better person. He is kind, knowledgeable, encouraging, confident yet humble. I still have A LOT to learn from him. By the way, he also tricked me to learn to play ultimate frisbee for four years...

Where did you go for undergrad? What did you study?

I went to the University of Richmond in Virginia in 2017 and graduated in May 2021. I majored in Global Studies: Politics and Governance, and minored in Math and French.

It is actually a coincidence for me to go there. U of R was originally not on my college list, but after talking with Mr. Morris about my intended major, international studies, he recommended this school. And when I visited U of R on the admitted student day, I fell in love with the college. I had wonderful 4 years at the school with amazing professors and friends.

What brought you to Harvard? What degree are you pursuing?

I am doing my Master's degree at Harvard Graduate School of Education, studying Education Policy and Analysis. And to be honest, I still haven't digested the fact that I am at Harvard...

I think what brought me to Harvard is my passion for quality education and education equity. When I was studying abroad, I visited a non-profit school in Nepal which provides marginalized children with quality life and quality education. I later volunteered as a teacher in that school and taught two classes. I saw their craving for knowledge, and witnessed that the education changed their lives. A female student of mine was inspired to be a lawyer advocating for gender equity in Nepal. All this is to say that I see the power of education, and I aspire to provide this power to more children.

Do you have any big plans for the future?

I think that I have a big, ambitious dream, but there is a long way to get there. I went to grad school straight out of undergrad, so I think I need more field experience before going into policymaking. My plan right now is to work at local branches of international organizations in underdeveloped countries, so that I can have more insights of the actual situations on the ground. After conducting program evaluation

and analysis qualitatively and quantitatively, I will be more confident that what I propose would close the gap between policymaking and its realization.


What does a perfect day off look like for you?






There is not one class, or group, or even one set of accomplished goals that define for me my time at MacDuffie. Rather, it is the overall sense of purpose and gratitude I feel when I think of all that has been.



I grew up in Springfield, down the hill, so to speak, from MacDuffie. A preparatory school for girls seemed like another world to me then. I attended Classical High School and was one of 2,000 students there. I loved my high school! There is no other way to say it. It was there that I started to find my voice as a writer and a learner. The teachers I had, moreover, were among the best I have ever known, including those I met as an undergraduate at Dartmouth College and a graduate student at Georgetown University.

The credentials I earned in college and graduate school certainly opened the door to my teaching at MacDuffie, but it was the respect I found for the teaching profession, first in my family home and then at my public high school, that provided the foundation for my teaching. What has kept me at it for 37 years, however, has been my students and the unique community they have helped shape. There is not one class, or group, or even one set of accomplished goals that define for me my time at MacDuffie. Rather, it is the overall sense of purpose and gratitude I feel when I think of all that has been. I still remember my first day. I was dressed in my black pumps, my best dress, and the pearl necklace my parents gave me as a graduation present. I was gathered with everyone else: ..students (all girls in 1984), staff, and teachers outside of Rutenber Hall, awaiting the ringing of the bell to announce the start of a new school year. If I was nervous on my first day of my first real job...and no doubt I was, any apprehension was quickly dispelled as Kirsten Light and Joy Goodhue, two of my soon-to-be freshmen students, came up to me and asked if I was to be their new teacher. Upon confirmation, they promptly put their arms through mine and ushered me into the auditorium. The faces have changed since that first day. For one, we became co-ed. And our campus is now in a different town, but my

students have continued to buoy and guide me to more than I could have expected when I first began what I think of as much more than a career. Today, I am the senior teacher on staff (alongside, I am so glad to say, my friend and colleague, Mr. Greg Vennell). The children of my former students are now my students. On this Friday afternoon before Spring Break, I am thinking of how quickly the years have passed and of so many of the students I have known. I am thinking, too, of the Advanced Placement Senior English class I just left: of our unit on Zora Neale Hurston, our pizza party to celebrate break, and our work with the Writing Lab. Like the students before them, my students today continue to challenge me, teach me, and share with me all that is our school. Who knew that "busin" was not a method of transportation! To our school in old New England and to all of you who have made it what it is, thank you."

Jamie B. (Wawryszyn) passed away at the hospice of the Fisher home on September 24, 2021. She taught English at The MacDuffie School.




Pamela F. Coleman, 62, passed away in her home on September 27, 2021. She worked at MacDuffie as the registrar, dorm parent, and student activities director.
